

AZERBAIJAN, BAKU 2008/2009



In the wonderful old town Baku the capital of Azerbaijan we had our successful **Compact Emergency Course (CEC)** - courses in 2008 and 2009.

The first course in 2008 ran over 7 days. During the first 5 days we held a professional training in theory and practice of CPR and Airway management, as well as general treatments and example cases in emergency, including theory speeches, training on puppets and role plays. Our trainees were professional doctors and medical stuff who work in the intensive care and emergency field in Baku city (around 20 people).

After the morning preparation we started! We worked in a very well organized and fully equipped conference center, so a high quality level was provided in every aspect during the whole course.



The course was held in English, which was directly translated into Russian. Everyone got scripts and hand-outs about the themes, and there was also enough time to answer special questions.

After these 5 days we held an open-air, two-day practical circuit training in first aid for medical staff (nurses, drivers, helpers, etc.) which included around 60 people.

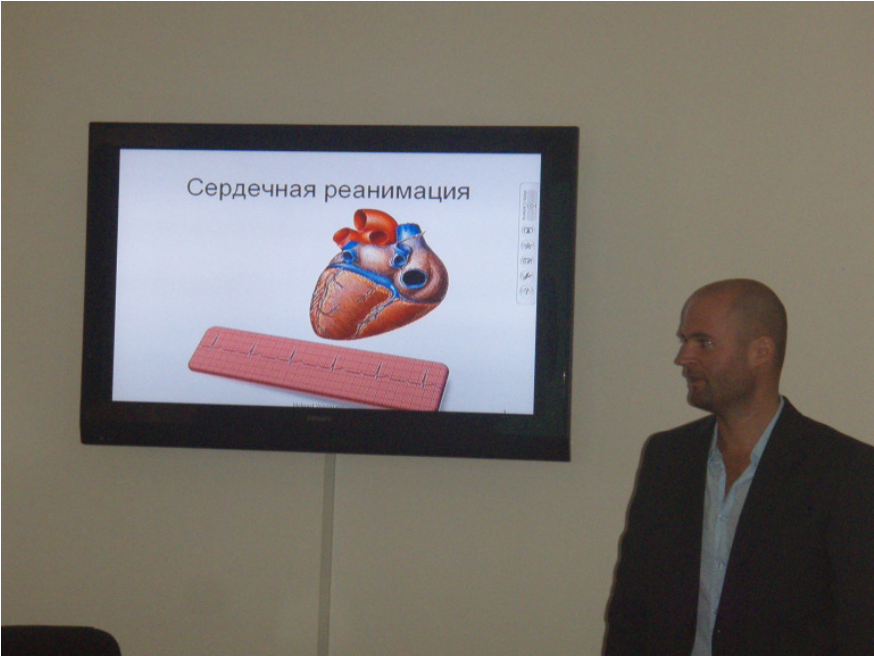


In this case the material was provided by our team - to show and introduce our standards - but mostly we work with the local equipment. (In order to check if the people can handle their own equipment.)

The second course in 2009 was mainly over ECG and heart emergency. We spoke in English, and were showing English and also Russian language slides. The script was in Russian language and the translator was present all the time for direct translation into Russian or Azerbaijani.



We have done a lot of work. Altogether it was nearly two full weeks. We closed the course with a test, and everyone who succeeded became a certification. There was not one trainee who failed, but more important was that everyone got a refreshment of his knowledge plus new ideas of emergency treatment.



We were also very happy and thankful to all the helpers - especially the translators, who made a fantastic job and brought the CEC-courses to full success!
